Opportunity

The Navy announced recently that the sixth nation-wide competitive examination for its College Training Program has been scheduled for December 8, 1951, and will be open to high school seniors or graduates within the age requirements. Successful candidates will be given a four-year college education at government expense and will be commissioned as officers of the Navy or Marine Corps upon graduation.

The program is open to male citizens of the United States between the ages of 17 and 21, and quotas have been assigned to each state and territory on the basis of its high school population. Those who are successful in passing the aptitude test will be interviewed and given physical examinations; then, if they are found in all respects qualified, their names will be submitted to state and territorial Selection Committees composed of prominent citizens and naval officers. The Navy expects to enter about 2,000 students into the program commencing with the fall term of college, 1952.

The students selected by these competitive examinations will be assigned to the 52 Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps units which are located in various universities and colleges in the United States. If accepted by the college, they will be appointed Midshipmen, U. S. N. R., and will have their tuition, books, and normal fees paid for by the Government. In addition they will receive pay at the rate of \$50.00 a month for the four-year period. Upon graduation they may be commissioned as officers in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and required to serve on active duty for two years. At the end

In the state of its treasury, as Mr. Kilgrew reported, the S. A. A. needs a 100% membership in order to have any worthwhile athletic program at all in S. H. S.

So come on, all you loyal Somerseters, stick by your S. A. A. and your school. Give a little and help a lot!!!

Somerset Holds Mansfield 0-0

A well coached Somerset eleven took on a Class C Mansfield team, last Saturday, which was supposed to be a powerhouse that would run all over the Raiders. But as the lucky fans that attended the game know, what we didn't have in weight we made up for in spirit.

Most of the action of the afternoon took place in two places; between the 30's and at the Mansfield goal line. Both teams used strictly a ground attack, with very few aerials being tried by either team. The Raiders completed two passes out of four tried. They were from Jerry DeCosta to Chuck Cloutier and from Cloutier to Burgess.

Somerset threatened to score in the closing minutes of the first half on a run by Jerry DeCosta and a quarter back sneak by Cloutier which captured a first down. Somerset's charging line held on the defense and provided excellent blocking on the offense.
