## Seniors Given Aid By Employment Office

As a part of the services offered by the Division of Employment Security to the welfare of the state as a whole and to the individual in particular, the counseling and testing service of the division is being made available to Somerset High seniors this year.

All those seniors who have no definite plans for further schooling are registered, interviewed, and if it is considered advisable tested in order to make possible better job placement and matching, thus making for better and more contented workers.

On Thursday morning, all seniors were registered and commercial students given clerical aptitude and spelling tests. On Friday, desk interviews are to be held with each of the registered students.

At some time in the near future, the General Aptitude Test Battery will be administered to those students to whom it will be of service.

As a result of this program, the Employment Office is provided with information which enables it to match students and jobs and to advise students regarding those abilities and aptitudes as revealed by the testing and interviewing.

Since the high school is unable to maintain an employment office, this co-operative program fulfills the need of both school and industry and exemplifies once more the opportunities presented by our school.
