HONOR ROLL

At the close of the marking period, Friday, October 28, reports will be given. An honor roll will be posted with the names of those who have a satisfactory average. The highest honors will consist of pupils who have an average of "A". The honors will consist of the names of pupils who have an average of "B". An attendance roll will also be posted for those who have neither been tardy or absent for a period of eight weeks.

CREDIT SYSTEM AND CLASS STANDING

The following is the basis of the credit system of our school:

- (1) Sixteen credits are required for graduation.
- (2) Three credits give Sophomore Standing.
- (3) Seven credits give Junior Standing.
- (4) Eleven credits give Senior Standing.

One subject taken five (5) times a week for a period of one year gives one point credit.

A subject taken three (3) times a week or for one half year gives one half (½) point credit.

Typewriting gives one half (½) point credit.

Chorus gives one quarter point per year.

Orchestra gives one quarter point per year.

Mechanical Drawing gives one quarter point per year.
Free Hand Drawing gives one quarter point per year.

In the first quarter, Barrington made a touch-down, but were unsuccessful for the point after. Our team, as a whole, played the best game thus far. Our line was sufficiently strong in holding out the opponents, although many of our forward passes did not materialize, we made up for their runs and line plunges.

Foulds made an exceptionally brilliant run down the field on a kick-off.

Although their team was quite a bit heavier than ours, our ends, Gray and Mazza, had tackled the receiver of the punt before he had time to get going.

Traynor made some brilliant tackles on line plunge passes, playing "still" center. As Traynor did, it was not an especially easy job to get in and make these tackles.

Foulds, on a line plunge, received a slight injury to his neck, and the full time of two minutes was taken, which was sufficient time for him to recover.

Griffin was handicapped by his lack of weight, but many of his end runs were successful.

Two or three times Foulds made fast time through line plunges through center. Our guards surely did their duty in making holes for the back field to go through in making line plunges.

The most successful play of the game, perhaps, for us was the double cross buck which was employed.

The game was comparatively short consisting of only four eight minute periods, a minute between each period, and fifteen minutes between the halves.

The game ended with a score of 6 to 0 in favor of Barrington.

Another game with Barrington is scheduled for Nov. 4th, and by all signs we have a chance to make up for this defeat.
