Miss Walsh Describes Academic Life In Belgium

If you lived in Belgium, what a completely different life you would lead.

In an interview with Miss Walsh, who has been in Liege, Belgium, for a year as a Fulbright Fellow, she gave the following picture of Belgium's school life.

Miss Walsh taught in a Teachers' College as well as in a Lycee (Junior College). As both of these schools are controlled by the government, the standards are extremely high. Students in the Lycee, who plan to go to the University, take Latin, Greek, modern languages, mathematics, physics, and chemistry. They take courses in art and music as well.

The Lycees and Athenees (boys schools) in Belgium begin at 8:10 in the morning and close at 4:30. In addition to the long hours, students have at least two and one half hours of homework each night.

Although classes are smaller than those in the United States, the teacher-pupil relationship is impersonal. Very rarely do teachers mingle with students or get an opportunity to know them well. How different it is in American schools.

Patch Tests Given To Pupils

This week the student body has been undergoing an extensive search. They have been trying to determine the presence of the dreaded disease, tuberculosis. On Wednesday they were taken off, and today, the results will be known. A positive reaction will call for an X-ray to determine the presence of tuberculosis in active form.

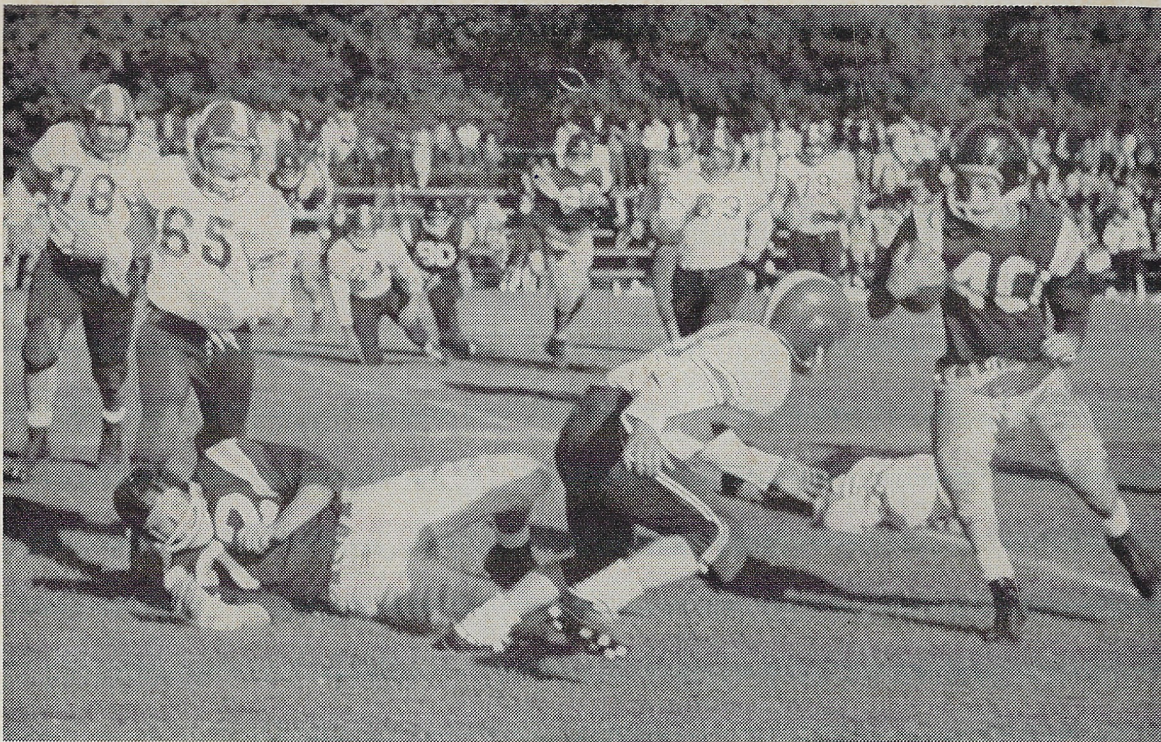
This should be an action-packed contest between these newly established rivals.

This year, under new coach Carlin Lynch, the Raiders face a challenge. After a mediocre year in 1957, only time will tell whether last year's juniors have matured. Moreover, this year the team has the toughest schedule in history.

Mr. Lynch has inserted innovations into the Raider squad. His teams generally run from a split-T, with a no cadence starting signal. This means that the quarterback will shout 'Hut 1—Hut 2—Hut 3—Hut 4'. They may have either long or short intervals between them. His defenses are varied for he believes a high school team should know many defenses and should change them often. His favorite is the 5-4-2 Oklahoma style defense. He's a strict disciplinarian with the usual no smoking and other indulgence rules and a 10 o'clock curfew, rigidly enforced. He likes a smart looking club, a fast, hard-hitting and eager club. Somerset High opened the 1958 football season at Mansfield High, on Sept. 29, before a crowd of 600, with a 14-0 victory.

Mansfield had little to offer in the way of an effective offense. They were hurt because their senior quarterback John Antosca, was out nursing a sore leg. The Hornets carried the ball 22 times for a total of 20 yards.

Taking advantage of a Mansfield fumble late in the first quarter, Jim Rockcliffe slanted around right end for the first and decisive tally. Rocky then plunged through for two more, making the score 8-0.

Second And Third Periods Scoreless

The second and third periods were scoreless, but in the final period, Somerset began to move. This time they were too much for the Hornets. A penalty brought the ball to the Mansfield 41. Quarterback Bill Taber hit end Manny Silvia with a pass to move the ball to the 7. On fourth and "goal to go", the "Jet" blazed across for his second touchdown of the day. The Raiders failed to get the extra point, and the day's scoring ended at 14-0.

The Somerset defense did as well as the offensive team, holding Mansfield to just four downs.

It was a well played game and we're sure the team lived up to Coach Lynch's expectations.
