Somerset Stops Dighton

On Saturday, October 11, the mighty Raider team, headed by Coach Simpson, handed Dighton High its first loss.

On the opening kick-off, Somerset received and immediately went to work on the Blue and Gold line. The Blue Raiders moved into scoring position only to fumble to Dighton. After Dighton fumbled on the next play, Somerset began to march to pay dirt. Jerry Archard drove through for the touch-down. Billy Burgess, then converted successfully for the extra point. After returning the ball down field, Dighton ended its probing attack as Berghman fumbled. After a series of plays the Blue and White Quarterback Tommy O'Connell passed successfully to Moe Ginalski, moving the ball deep into Dighton territory. On the next play Jerry Archard, a sensational sophomore back, scooted the end and put Somerset in the lead 13-0. The try for the extra point was in vain. In the second quarter, Dighton edged the ball deep into Raider territory and Berghman, their ace, pushed over the fourth down to score. Their running attempt for a very important extra point was successful. After the kick-off, Dighton intercepted a Raider pass and romped for a touch-down. The Dighton conversion failed. Thus stood the score 13-13 as the first half came to close.

In the third quarter after a series of fumbles the score remained the same. Somerset, controlling the ball for the major part of the fourth quarter, finally renewed their scoring attack, with Burgess again, on a 30 yard run, scoring. Dighton again fumbled and

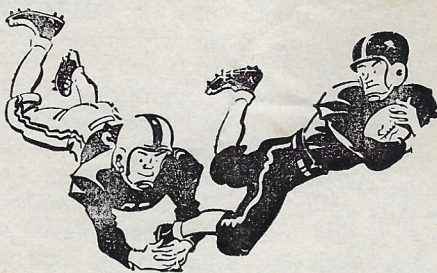
